A MESSAGE FROM THE GRAND MASTER

As I approach the final months of my time in the Grand East of Minnesota Freemasonry, I look back on a year of wonderful memories. I have seen a wide variety of lodges and an even wider variety of Masons and terrific fellowship. I am as amazed now as I was the day I was installed as your Grand Master at both the endless differences and similarities in our lodges across the state.

At a recent lodge meeting on my many travels, I was chatting with a sideliner and noticed a 50-year pin on his lapel. He mentioned that he had dropped out of the local Lions Club after nearly thirty years of membership there. But he also commented that he was looking forward to the next fifty years with his lodge. I don't know why it had not occurred to me before that evening, but it really emphasized a point of difference

between our fraternity and so many other organizations for community-minded men. Organizations like the Lions, Rotary, American Legion, and Kiwanis Club certainly provide opportunities for men to give back. However, when they are no longer active in these fine organizations, they often withdraw their membership and cease paying dues. Whether or not they remain active, fewer men seem to drop their membership in Freemasonry.

Perhaps it's because joining a Lions Club does not make one a lion. But joining a Masonic Lodge means becoming a Mason, and it tends to become a part of who we are. We all know of brother Masons who have not been to lodge for years, yet still pay their dues to support the organization that has such great moral, philosophical, and patriotic value. I have had the unique opportunity to see the glow in the eyes of a member receiving a fifty-year pin even though he has not been active for many years.

All of this has led me to ask: why has the number of NPDs (non-payment of dues) been slowly increasing over the past few years? Maybe they grew tired of going to meetings with little more going on than approving minutes and paying bills. Or could it be that we have let them down? They came to us enthusiastic and were proud of becoming Master Masons, but did we successfully deliver on the promises of a life-changing experience and high ideals? Or the opportunity for meaningful community engagement? All too often, the promises for these opportunities were never fulfilled.

When I asked one very active member how his lodge intends to maintain the enthusiastic atmosphere with the many new members they had recently welcomed, his answer was simple: keep them busy and engaged. This lodge has capitalized on its new members' devotion by increasing community events and internal projects. Doing so has enabled their new members to feel like they are genuinely a part of something important, not only within the lodge but also out of the lodge by positively impacting their local community.

New members will not remain active simply because it is what we want from them. They will remain active and devoted when they are able to fill a need within themselves (which starts with us delivering a quality experience across the board). They will stay for their reasons, not ours.

Leadership in Masonry: The LAMP OF KNOWLEDGE

FROM THE GRAND LODGE EDUCATION OFFICER WB BRADLEY PHELPS



It's that time of year when new officers are being installed in lodges across the state. I've had the privilege of attending numerous lodge installations, and it's always a refreshing

experience. Participating in these ceremonies reminds me of the significant responsibilities that lodge officers willingly assume.

I understand firsthand that, amidst the moment's nervousness, the words' whole meaning may not always be comprehended immediately. I encourage everyone to review the manual, particularly the section that covers the installation of officers. Within those pages, you'll find a wealth of beauty in the words, thoughts, and philosophy, providing a clearer understanding of officer duties and roles.

Regarding the Lodge Education Officer, we are reminded that "The LAMP OF KNOWLEDGE reminds us that no Mason can possess the philosophy or instill the tenets of Masonry without sound education and life-long learning. Knowledge must enlighten the mind and heart to apply our ideals."

While there is more to explore in the manual, I hope these words resonate and emphasize the immense importance and responsibility carried by Lodge Education Officers. Their work is crucial, and I urge them to approach their duties with diligence and dedication.

In a recent installation, I was asked by a close friend to be a chaplain. Looking at the installation work, I saw two different invocations to learn. I could have read either of them, but did my best to memorize them. I did the work not only for my friend but for my own personal growth. I must admit, it has been a while since I have memorized anything new, but it was a good exercise in mental muscle.

I realized long ago that Masonry is a perfect and supportive platform to stretch our comfort zone and better ourselves with the support of the Brothers around us. While there are many different styles and approaches, nobody sets out to see us fail. On the contrary, it is quite the opposite. If there were ever a place to challenge our comfort zones, it should be Freemasonry. This institution has an officer to help encourage our continuous growth and improvement, and it should be an activity encouraged at every meeting and through all our endeavors.

The quote, "If a man empties his purse into his head, no one can take it from him," is credited to Brother Benjamin Franklin. These words remind me of cherished advice from my grandfather: "Life is full of fleeting desires and vanities that can be taken away at any time. There is one thing they cannot take away, and that is your brain. Make your adventure one of the heart and mind." This sentiment is also echoed by Victor Frankl in his book, "Man's Search for Meaning," and is described as the last human freedom.

My hat goes off to lodge education officers and their continued pursuits of teaching, coaching, and inspiring lodge members everywhere to push themselves.

Regardless of your station in the lodge, you are welcome, and I encourage your sharing of thoughts and participation. There will be an opportunity to join remotely or in person in the metro area. Additionally, consider joining us at the Midwest Conference on Masonic Education (MCME) May 3-5, 2024, in Bloomington. It is a multi-jurisdictional education conference. This year's theme focuses on improving ways of presenting and educating those around you.

In the meantime, I hope your holidays are bright and your life is an adventure of the heart and mind.





97 Welcome back to the Masonic Conundrum!

Conundrum #97 ANSWER: Buffalo Bill Cody

In 2019, I hopped on my trusty chrome horse and headed towards Colorado with a fellow adventure-seeking Brother. Reflecting on these moto-adventures, getting there is half the fun. Sometimes I imagine that I am a cowboy travelling across the countryside and making my way to



our destination. It is eye opening to see the kindness of people and the beauty of nature, the mom-and-pop diners, shops, and attractions along the way.

Our itinerary included Estes Park, Mt. Evans, Rocky Mountain National Park and

exploring (sometimes literally) breathtaking motorcycle routes. After conquering Mount Evan's summit, we found ourselves in Golden Colorado paying respect to a very famous Freemason at his final resting place.

Buffalo Bill Cody was the real deal – he did not wonder what it would be like to cross the frontier on horseback – he lived it. Brother William Frederick Cody was born February 26, 1846 in Le Claire, Iowa. His father Isaac Cody was vocally anti-slavery and was attacked and stabbed twice with a Bowie knife after giving an antislavery speech. He never



fully recovered from the injuries, and eventually died of a respiratory infection compounded by the lingering effects of the stabbing. After Isaac's death, the family suffered financially and at the age of 11, Bill started employment as a message carrier to help support his family.

He continued to be a Pony Express rider, a scout in the American Civil War and during the Indian Wars, stagecoach driver, hotel manager, hunter, and of course a famous showman. Buffalo Bill's Wild West show traveled around the United States, Great Britian, and Europe. His involvement with the show arguably made him one of the most famous Americans ever, and one of the most photographed of his time.

Early in his stage career, Cody traveled to Chicago to make his stage debut with his friend Texas Jack Omohundro in the show, "The Scouts of the Prairie". In 1873, Cody invited his friend and mentor "Wild Bill" Hickok to join the group. While they parted ways shortly afterwards, they remained friends until Wild Bill's murder in Deadwood, SD. After

ten years of shows and scouting, Cody founded the Buffalo Bill's Wild West near North Platte, Nebraska. The show ran from 1883 until 1913 (although Bill continued to perform until 1916).
